

Move For Cash Payment of Soldiers' Bonus Without New Tax Wins Support

Washington, Nov. 27.—Moves for cash payment of the soldiers' bonus without increasing taxes gained new adherents among house Democrats and Republicans today despite reports that President Roosevelt would insist upon new levies if Congress persisted in passing the \$2,200,000,000 measure.

Both said they had conferred with members of their parties and found no opposition to paying off the bonus. Each predicted the house would pass it over a presidential veto, although they disclaimed knowledge as to what action the senate would take in the event of a veto.

BOARD OF EDUCATION SUBMITS PLAN TO SECURE 3 BUILDINGS

(Continued from page one) The board of education took the position that these schools will have to be taken care of some time and that the three districts, Mountain View, Mulberry and Millers Creek, have never received anything of permanence in the way of school buildings, while the other central schools do have modern buildings, although all buildings in the central districts are crowded to some extent.

Members of the board of education also discussed the crowded conditions in the other schools of the county and stated their desire that all of them be cared for but due to the urgent and immediate need the districts named above were given first consideration.

After a lengthy discussion by the two boards the board of commissioners took the matter under consideration and will report their decision to C. B. Eller, county superintendent of instruction.

All members of both boards were present. The board of commissioners is now composed of D. B. Swaringen, chairman, M. F. Absher and Ralph Duncan, with O. F. Eller, register of deeds, clerk. The board of education is composed of C. O. McNeill, chairman, R. R. Church and D. F. Sheppard.

The board of education pointed out the drastic need of the buildings and is favoring taking advantage of the opportunity to have the buildings constructed when the relief administration can furnish the labor without cost to the county. It was brought out by the board of education that such labor can be secured and that arrangements had already been made with relief authorities.
