

Wilson's Tax Accounts Short \$2,557

Boone, Jan. 1.—It was announced here today by Charles F. Hagaman, Hickory accountant, that a shortage of \$2,557 had been found in the accounts of Len F. Wilson, tax collector of Wilkes county and former Appalachian football star who has been missing since December 19.

The shortage, Hagaman said, began November 3 and continued until December 19 as Wilson's accounts had been checked up to the former date and nothing other than clerical errors had been found.

Wilson, who is 24 years old, was named tax collector in August, 1933, upon the death of his father, A. D. Wilson, who had served in that capacity for a number of years.

2,000,000 More Men Called By England

London, Jan. 1.—The British government, anticipating the start of "the real war" on the western front early in the spring, tonight ordered nearly 2,000,000 more men to be ready to join the fighting ranks by a royal proclamation signed by King George VI in privy council.

The proclamation, ordering six classes of conscripts ranging in age from 19 through 28 years of age from 19 through 28 years of age, will bring to well over 3,000,000 men the Britons actually under arms or liable to service.

The proclamation affects the age classes of 19, 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27 and some who are now 28 years of age.

It was the fourth royal proclamation calling up men for registration under the national services (armed forces) act since the crisis period preceding the outbreak of the war on September 3.

Britain still has far to go before general conscription is reached because the national services act makes every male British sub-

ject between 18 and 41 liable to military service.

Sir Thomas Phillips, permanent secretary of the ministry of labor, said it was believed that all six new classes would be called to the colors before the end of 1940.

Hotel Fire Claims At Least 18 Lives

Cigarette Tossed Into Garbage Chute Blame For Minneapolis Fire

Minneapolis, Jan. 3.—A cigarette tossed down a garbage chute was blamed today for fire that claimed at least 18 lives at the Marlborough apartment hotel in the worst disaster in this city's history.

Only 12 victims had been identified as firemen prodded about in the wreckage of the three-story, 45-year-old building, seeking the bodies of possible additional victims.

Red Cross workers said there were 114 persons in the building when the fire broke out. Of these, 18 were known dead, 24 were registered at hospitals, 53 had registered with the Red Cross as either uninjured or slightly injured, and 19 were unaccounted for.
