Rock Creek News Polio Victims In South Carolina Receiving Help

> Charleston, S. C .- Victims of an epidemic of infantile paralysis in South Carolina last summer which cost more than \$15,000 for treatment and counted 438 cases, are still receiving help.

It was revealed here today by Mayor Henry M. Lockwood that the 175 victims in Chauston county have a fighting chance to emerge with a minimum of crippling after-effects as the result of the recent re-assumption of orthopedic nursing service here.

In a letter to national headquarters of the Committee for the Celebration of the President's Birthday, which is now conducting its annual campaign for funds for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis he declared that two nurses are working in the Charleston area, after a lapse of more than a month.
