New Japanese Government Named

Tokyo, Jan. 17.—A new Japanese government under Admiral Mitsuomasa Yonai was installed today at the imperial palace.

The new premier declared that his cabinet, considered by Japanese and foreign observers alike, to be of stop-gap calibre, would continue generally the foreign policy of his predecessor, General Nobuyuki Abe, emphasizing settlement of Japanese-American problems with the United States and Great Britain, while seeking friendship with Soviet Russia.

The policy declaration was made in an interview with the Japanese press.

LLOYD GEORGE IS 77 TODAY

London, Jan. 17.—David Lloyd George, who has had a prominent role in two of Britain's wars, may be given a voice in the conduct of a third war, it was reported today, on his 77th birthday.

Should Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain quit, it was said, Lloyd George might be sought out for the unofficial role of "elder statesman" and adviser, whose inspiring record in the World War could help animate the country's war effort again.

This would be expected to be the case especially if Lloyd George's old World War cronies, Winston Churchill, became prime minister.

The fiery little Welshman with the flowing white mane already has seen the Allies profit in this war by the victories he won over politicians, generals and admirals in conducting the World War.
