The admiralty announced the sinking by a German U-boat torpedo of the 1,375-ton destroyer Daring, with the loss of nine officers and 148 men. Only one officer and four men, of the complement of 162, were accounted for. It was the sixth destroyer lost in the war, of 179 commissioned and 25 building.

Daring was the first destroyer torpedoed in the war. Four others were mined. The fifth was lost in a collision.

Forty survivors of the 8,022on British tanker Imperial Transport were landed at a Scots port yesterday. The ship had been cut in two by a German torpedo in the North Sec. The crew took to boats. But finding that the stern half of the ship remained afloat, and that the engines were workable, they returned and struggled along for four days until a warship took them off. Two men drowned.
