Students To Make Local Job Survey

Comprehensive Information To Be Gathered By 26 High School Pupils

Twenty-six high school boys and girls, members of the class in the study of occupations in the North Wilkesboro high school, are engaged in a survey of all the possible types of employment in North Wilkesboro.

They have recently completed classification of all the various businesses of the town, and have listed them in seven groups. These groups are headed Government, Manufacturing, Transportation, Financial and Commercial, Personal and Public Service, Professional, and Trade.

During the next two weeks these boys and girls will get in touch with the management of all business firms in the city, in order to determine the number of employees and the types of work which they do.

When this information is completed, it will be made available to all the students in the high school and to the employers. The complete list of occupations in which the people of North Wilkesboro engage and the number of persons occupied in each will be filed for public reference with the North Wilkesboro Commerce Bureau.

It is felt that this information will be of great aid to young people in planning their future vocational choice. With definite knowledge as to the availability of jobs in the community, they will know better how to choose an occupation in a field which is not over-crowded.

State College Answers Timely Farm Question

Question: Is the AAA making payments to North Carolina farmers this year for growing a home garden?

Answer: Yes. A payment of \$1.50 will be made to any farmer for planting a home garden. However, he must plant at least one-tenth acre of vegetables for each member of the family and must protect the garden from livestock and poultry. Of course, he must use good cultural practices. Not more than one acre of vegetables will be required of any farmer for payment.

Only 80 per cent of the U. S. farm homes have vegetable gardens.
