**Outlook Dark For The Tobacco Crop**

Washington.—A generally unfavorable outlook for flue-cured tobacco during the 1940-41 season was reported Monday by the Department of Agriculture on the eve of the capital parley on proposed amendments to the AAA tobacco program.

Abnormally large prospective supply and reduced export outlets are the major factors in the gloomy picture forecast for flue-cured tobacco growers by the department.

Reduced exports and the large 1939 production of 1,132,400,000 pounds are expected to result in flue-cured stocks as of July 1 totaling 1,450,000,000. This is more than 53 per cent larger than flue-cured stocks a year earlier.

These facts will be reflected in the meeting Wednesday at which the entire legislative program for flue-cured tobacco is to be thrown open for discussion. Growers, farmer representatives, members of Congress from all flue-cured tobacco areas, and other interested individuals are expected to participate in the meeting.
