

School Children May See Famous Picture This Week

The North Wilkesboro board of education has arranged for dismissal of classes for final hour of school on two afternoons this week to permit attendance of school children at the Liberty Theatre matinee, where "Gone With the Wind" is showing. The arrangement was made to avoid confusion at school and to accommodate the large number of children whose parents wanted them to see the picture. High school pupils will be dismissed at two p. m. Wednesday and elementary grades at two p. m. Thursday. Parents are requested to cooperate in order that afternoon school attendance will not be disrupted.

SMITHEY RE-ELECTED G. O. P. CHAIRMAN

Introduced Robert H. McNeill to the convention and he began his address with remarks of reverence for Wilkes county, his native land.

The theme of his address was the urge that Republicans have made in the records of their party. He pointed out how the administrations of Lincoln, McKinley and Teddy Roosevelt, Harding and Coolidge had responded to the challenge to lift the nation from desperate crisis and predicted that a Republican president elected in 1940 will succeed equally as well.

He condemned the national administration for increasing the national debt to 44 billions and said that expenses of government have trebled since 1933 instead of being reduced 25 per cent as promised by Franklin D. Roosevelt before his election. He pointed out that the government is collecting about \$225,000,000 in taxes in North Carolina and is spending only \$42,000,000 in the state yearly. He said that in Alabama the federal government is spending three dollars for every dollar of taxes collected.

He said the great mission of the G. O. P. is to put ten million unemployed to work and that it can be done by use of economy, thrift and common sense. He condemned crop control as infringement on personal liberty and stated the belief that farms and industries would not be able to produce enough if all the people were able to supply their needs.

Turning his guns on the Democratic party in the state, he cited the growth in state expenditures from \$18,500,000 thirteen years ago to \$80,000,000 this year. His address was received with much interest.

The convention passed a resolution offered by Dr. J. Sam Holbrook endorsing the candidacy of Robert H. McNeill for governor and asking that Republicans cast their votes for him in the primary.

Resolutions of respect were passed by the convention relative to the death of J. M. Brown.

In another resolution the convention condemned New Deal leadership in national affairs, the system of planned economy which has "driven the government into debt that staggers the imagination"; condemned the public school system in North Carolina for requiring school teachers "to pledge allegiance to the New Deal party, both in their vote and in their financial support"; condemned "cloakroom politicians who take from people the right to elect whom they want to manage affairs of local government; condemned undemocratic principles of administering relief and public assistance and many other acts of the opposition party. The resolutions will be published in this newspaper Thursday.

Chairman Casey presented candidates who have filed for the various offices to the convention. He began with introduction of Dave Mink, candidate for commissioner in district number 1, whom he described as so good that the Democrats tried to have him file on their ticket. Other candidates for commissioner recognized were G. C. Hamby in district number 2 and M. F. Absher, present board chairman, for district three. T. E. Story and A. Caudill, candidates for the legislature, C. C. Sidden and Carl Church, candidates for register of deeds, were also presented.

N. B. Smithey called attention to the new registration and that registration books will open on April 27.

er purchasers who had failed to make their payments.

He said of the three and one-half million people in North Carolina 900,000 are school children. Of these one-third live in the towns and one third live near enough to school to walk and the other third, 320,000, ride to school in 44,000 buses. He said sources of taxes are as follows: Inheritance tax, \$750,000 per year; Income tax, 11,000,000 per year; Franchise tax, \$8,000,000 per year; License and privilege, \$1,750,000 per year; liquor tax, \$900,000 per year; sales tax, \$11,000,000 per year. In all 39 to 40 million per year.

Of this amount 5 1-2 million is paid annually on the State's debt; for schools \$26,000,000 this year and 27 million next year.

The speaker urged that people be as cautious about the tax system as a business man is about his business. He thinks a proper tax system and good labor conditions will do more than anything else to bring business to the state.

J. B. McCoy called attention to the election of Dr. Fred Hubbard as president of North Carolina Hospital Association at its meeting in Winston-Salem recently.

Richard Finley, chairman of the finance committee, stated his committee had made arrangements with the Briar Hopper Boys of Charlotte, to appear here in person at the North Wilkesboro school auditorium May 10 and stated that the club would receive one half of the proceeds.
