Mrs. Benjey Parlier Is S. S. Class Hostess



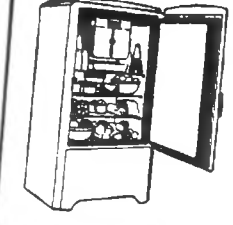

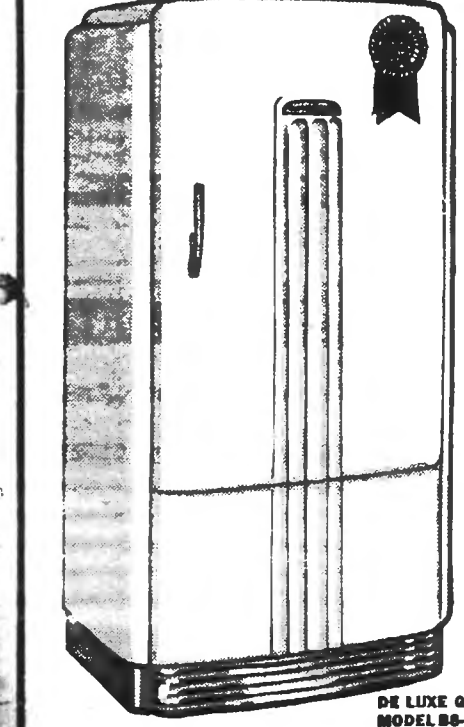
