### Good Matches In German Raiders Harass Shipping

Berlin, July 13.—Germany's sea raiders, whose operations against merchant shipping have not been reported officially since the scuttling of the pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee last December, are in action again.

The High Command announced in its communique yesterday that a single warship had sunk 18,500 tons of "enemy merchant shipping in overseas waters."

No further details were given. But Germans assumed the raiders, modern counterparts of the World War Emden and Karlsruhe, would be more active now that German ships can operate from bases all along the Atlantic coast from Southern France to the Arctic Circle.
