Farmers throughout the tobacco growing section of the country voted overwhelmingly Saturday for a two-year program of government crop control with marketing quotas.

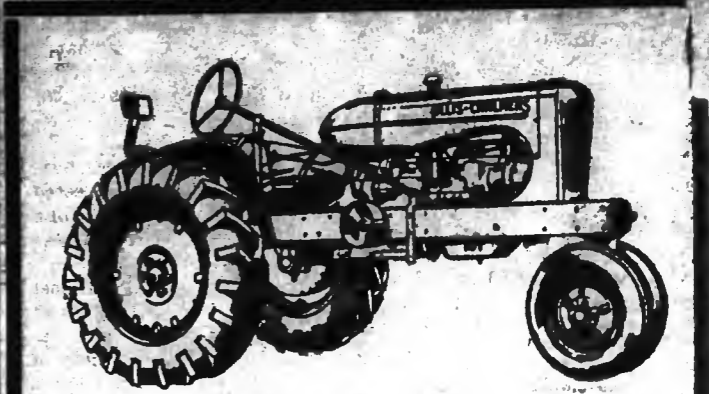
