

# National Guard May Mobilize September 16

Atlanta.—Major General H. D. Howell, commander of the 30th division of the national guard, announced yesterday September 15 that he has been tentatively set for mobilization of the division.

The announcement followed a meeting with adjutants general of the four states in which divisions troops are located, Georgia, North and South Carolina, and Tennessee.

Construction activity already under way at Camp Jackson, S. C. where, army officers said, the 30th division will go into training. Under the national guard mobilization bill passed by Congress and before the President, the guardsmen may be called out for a 12-month period of training.

Adjutants general at the conference were John Skiddard of Georgia, James C. Dorler of South Carolina, J. Van B. Metts of North Carolina, and Thomas F. Frazier of Tennessee.

Saturday afternoon, August 31. School buses will be scheduled to arrive at the Wilkesboro school just before nine o'clock Monday morning, September 1. The registration of students will begin at nine o'clock and students will be dismissed on Monday as soon as registration has been completed. After Monday, school will open at eight-thirty o'clock each morning and be dismissed at three o'clock in the afternoon.

The average daily attendance of the Wilkesboro Central school was sufficiently high during the past school year to gain two teachers. The State school commission allotted the school one additional elementary teacher and one additional high school teacher.

The addition of these two teachers has enabled a program to be planned that should prove more interesting to students and result in greater achievement in all their work.
