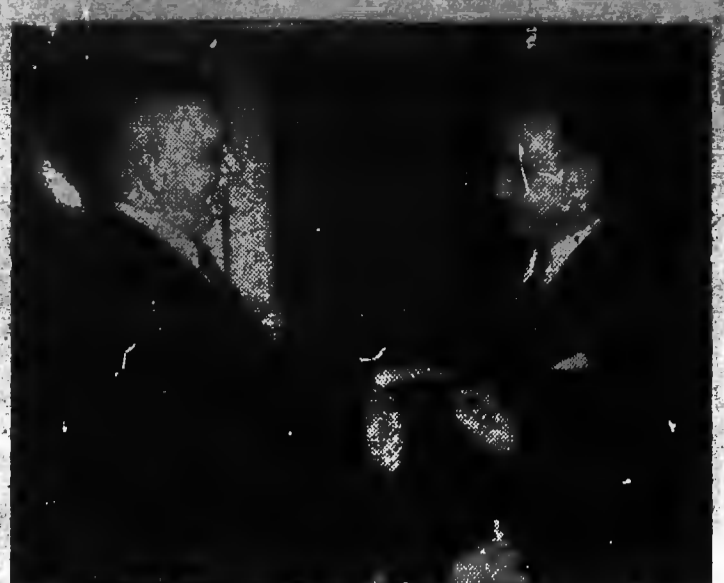
Gudger-Parker Marriage Vows Announced
