'THEY MET IN ARGENTINA'
Alberto Vila, the sensational South American troubadour, strums his stuff to the delight of (left) James Ellison and Maureen O'Hara, and (extreme right) Robert Barrat. This picture will open at the Allen Monday for a two day run.

Replete with sprightly songs and colorful dances of the pampas, "They Met in Argentina" brings Maureen O'Hara, James Ellison and the new Latin discovery, Alberto Vila, to the screen in a gay story of a young American's romantic adventures below the equator.

Miss O'Hara is seen as the spirited daughter of a wealthy Irish-Argentine rancher and Ellison has the role of an oil company geologist, with Vila as a young Argentine sportsman. The romance begins on Pan-American day at the Turf Club at Buenos Aires during the running of the Pan-American Handicap. The race is won by Lucero, a horse belonging to Miss O'Hara's imperious old father, Robert Barrat. Ellison's Texan employer has ordered him to buy Lucero.

Through another young American who knows Barrat's head gauchito, Ellison arranges to visit Barrat's big estate and pose as a cattle buyer rather than reveal his real purpose. But the daughter, who at first thinks Ellison has followed her to the estate for romantic reasons, learns his true objective and sets about defeating his plan.

The conflict between the romance and the business deal, and the added complications of a handsome young Argentine rival for the daughter's hand, all make for the picture's stirring conclusions.

The featured cast also includes Buddy Ebsen as Ellison's companion, Joseph Buloff as the head gauchito, Diosa Cotello as Buddy's girl-friend at the estate. Ten sparkling Rodgers and Hart tunes are woven through the fabric of the story, all of them written especially to fit the key sequences. Several spirited dance numbers, including a genuine tango and a spectacular gauchito "Chaco" dance, enhance the gaiety of the film.

The picture also shows for the first time on the screen the perilous Argentine game known as "El Peto," a free-for-all battle on horseback that was banned for many years in the South American republic because of the high percentage of fatalities among the participants. The game sequences are said to set a new high in thrills for theatre audiences.

Leslie Goodwins and Jack Hively directed the RKO Radio production by Lou Brock, with Frank Veloz of the famous Veloz and Yolanda duo directing the dance numbers. Jerry Cady wrote the screen play, and the cast also includes Antonio Moreno, Luis Alberni and Fortunio Bonanova.
