Popular Demand Brings Navy Hit To Liberty Screer

Acclaimed by naval officers the most authentic story ever written about the historic United States Naval Academy, "Navy Blue and Gold" opens Tuesday at the Liberty Theatre for a return engagement in answer to widespread popular demand.

The novel, steeped in colorful traditions of the institution, was written by George Bruce who also adapted it to the screen.

The picture is headed by a strong cast including James Stewart, Robert Young, Lionel Barrymore, Florence Rice, Billie Burke, Tom Brown, Samuel S. Hinds, Paul Kelly and Barnett Parker.

It portrays the poignant devotion of cadets pledged to their country's service, the heartaches of stern, character-building discipline, the thrilling sportsmanship of the Navy's titanic football games, and the love of two players for the sister of their pal.

"Navy Blue and Gold" teams Stewart, Young and Tom Brown as buddies coming from different walks of life to rise to prominence as midshipmen at Annapolis.

Mrs. Stewart portrays a Navy officer up from a battleship to try for stripes at the naval academy. Young is seen as a Southern football hero who has no intention of remaining in the service. Brown is a contrasting role as the spoiled youngster of a wealthy family who learns how to "take it."

Stewart is involved in a scandal when it is learned that he enrolled at the Academy under an assumed name, owing to the fact that his father, a navy officer, has been cashiered out of the service. He clears his father's name in a dramatic scene and is reinstated.

Miss Rice portrays the sister of Tom Brown, and Barnett Parker has the comic role of an English butler who aids his young master's career.

Many scenes for the picture were filmed on the grounds at Annapolis, under the direction of Sam Wood. Commander Harvey S. Haislip, U. S. N., retired, served as technical adviser for Navy scenes.

Bogus Stocks And Bonds Offered

Information reaching this department indicates that there is much activity in the rural sections of the State on the part of strangers who are offering various types of oil leases, stock in cemeteries, etc., in exchange for securities held by our citizens.

From inquiries and complaints received by this office and from investigations made, I believe it can be fairly estimated that in this State three out of every four victims of unscrupulous securities salesmen are farm folk. Many victims hesitate to complain for fear of appearing ridiculous, but my experience convinces me that a few resolute and energetic victims are more effective than anything that could be done to curb this activity.

Every person engaged in the business of selling securities in this State is required to be registered with this department, either as a dealer or a salesman. Every registered salesman is given a small registration card which sets forth his name, registration number, the name of the dealer employing him, the date of issuance and expiration. This card is signed by the Secretary of State, who is ex-officio Securities Commissioner in North Carolina. Therefore, prospective investors should first request the salesman to produce this card. Examine it and be sure it has not expired. If the salesman cannot produce his registration card, obtain his name and address if possible, and forward same to this department, together with a brief account of the circumstances involved. Never purchase a security from a salesman who cannot produce this registration card.

State Boosts Rank In Defense Business

Palatka, July 7.—North Carolina's defense contracts awarded through June 15, have amounted to \$141,972,559, the department of conservation and development through its publicity director Charles J. Parlier announced Monday.

The figures were based on the releases of J. T. Anderson, director of the division of commerce and industry in the department of conservation and development, and show that the state has moved from 27th to 22nd place among the commonwealths within four months. February 28, 1941, North Carolina stood at 27, at which time the state's defense contract total was a shade above \$54,000,000.

The June 15 report, the department said Monday, does not include contracts awarded after June 2, and therefore does not reflect the recent boat-building contracts let by the United States navy. Mr. Anderson thinks this will bring the total well above \$150,000,000.
