were: high school building with 12 classrooms and large auditorium; large library room, science laboratory, home economics laboratory, vocational agricultural laboratory, space for school cafeteria.

Brushy Mountain—Mountain Crest, Cherry Grove, Parker, Gilreath and China Grove are one teacher schools with total enrollment of 151. Need four-classroom building with auditorium; library and lunchroom; steam heat water, plumbing and sewage disposal system.

Moravian Falls—Enrollment last year 248. school has no auditorium. Needs include auditorium, two classrooms, library and cafeteria, steam heat and sewage disposal system.

Somers township schools—Present conditions are one and two teacher schools at Windy Gap, Somers, Osbornville, Lovelace, Shady Grove, Mt. Pisgah, Spurgeon, Lewis, with total enrollment of 305. Need nine-classroom building with auditorium, library, cafeteria, heat, water, plumbing and sewage disposal system, six acres land.

Boomer school—Present brick veneer building needs toilet rooms, heat, plumbing and sewage disposal.

Ferguson—School has seven standard classrooms and eight teachers; enrollment 261. Need two additional classrooms, library, cafeteria, heat, plumbing and sewage disposal, four more acres of land.

Mount Pleasant—Enrollment last year was 552, school has enough students for 13 teachers but has only eight adequate classrooms; Congo and Stony Hill should be consolidated.

Needs include ten-room building with large auditorium, library, science laboratory, home economics laboratory, vocational agricultural department, school cafeteria and five additional acres of land.

Millers Creek—School has 25 teachers and building has 15 classrooms; community is growing fast, enrollment last year was 901.

Needs 12 additional classrooms, library and cafeteria, science laboratory, home economics laboratory and vocational agriculture department.

Cricket—Present wood building inadequate, enrollment would be about 350. School has only six teachers with many students leaving because of condition of building.

Need ten-room elementary building with auditorium, library room, cafeteria, six acres of land.

Union Township School—One and two-teacher schools at Piney Ridge, Concord, Whittington, Miller, Shepherd, Sherman, Loggins and White Oak has total enrollment of 561.

Needs ten-room building with auditorium, cafeteria, well, heat, plumbing, sewage disposal system, six acres land.

Fairplains—Students now being transferred to overcrowded Malberry school; fast growing community, Flint Hill should be consolidated with Fairplains.

Needs eight-room elementary building with auditorium, library room and cafeteria, well, heat, and sewage disposal system.

Mountain View—Enrollment last year 798. Deberry school with 10 should be consolidated; has 20 teachers and 28 rooms with no room for library, science laboratory, home economics laboratory and vocational agriculture department.

Needs four additional rooms and 1/2 Malberry high school students go to Mountain View instead of North Wilkesboro. Four more rooms would be needed.

Trephill—School has ten teachers with eight standard rooms, enrollment 380 but with Joynes and Roaring Gap schools consolidated would be 513.

Needs six additional classrooms, science, home economics and vocational laboratories, sewage disposal system and five more acres land.

Austin—Needs water, heat, plumbing and sewage disposal. Ronda—School has 17 teachers with only 11 standard classrooms; enrollment last year 636; fast growing community.

Needs new building with eight classrooms and large auditorium, library, science laboratory, home economics laboratory and vocational agriculture department; sewage disposal system.

Pleasant Ridge—Need new elementary building to house 137 children now in Pleasant Ridge and Mine Ridge schools. Five classrooms, library, auditorium, cafeteria, water, heat and sewage disposal system needed. Enrollment of two schools last year 137.

Pleasant Hill—School has five teachers with only four standard rooms; enrollment 176, fast growing community near Elkin.

Needs four-room building with auditorium, heating, plumbing and sewage disposal system.

Benham—Needs plumbing and sewage disposal system.

Climax—School has five teachers with four standard rooms. Enrollment was 177 and Dennyville, with 70, should be consolidated, making enrollment 247.

Needs five additional rooms, heat, plumbing and sewage disposal.

Roaring River—School has 15 teachers with only seven standard classrooms; enrollment 557.

Needs ten-room building with large auditorium, provisions for library, science, home economics and vocational agricultural department, cafeteria and sewage disposal system.

Lincoln Heights (colored)—School has 15 teachers with ten standard classrooms. Thankful. Parks Grove and Rock Creek should be consolidated. Total enrollment would be 557.

Needs ten-room school building with large auditorium, library, science and home economics laboratory and cafeteria; also heating, plumbing and sewage disposal system for entire school.
