Bynum C. Price Taken By Death

Prominent Citizen Of Moravian Falls Community Died At Home Today

Bynum Columbus Price, age 68, prominent citizen of the Moravian Falls community, died at one a. m. today at his home. He had been seriously ill for several days and in ill health for two years.

Funeral will be held Friday, 11 o'clock, at Walnut Grove Baptist church. The pastor, Rev. E. C. Shoe, of Taylorsville, will be assisted by Rev. C. C. Holland, of Hickory, a former pastor.

Surviving Mr. Price are his widow, Mrs. Geneva Frazier Price, and four sons: Mack, Hubert and Arville Price, of Pores Knob, and Sherman Price, of Wilkesboro. Also surviving are three sisters: Mrs. Andrew Broyhill, of Pores Knob; Mrs. D. W. Speaks, of Statesville; Mrs. Geneva Lowe, of Moravian Falls. He was a son of the late Logan and Elizabeth Robinson Price.

Mr. Price was one of Wilkes county's best known citizens and for several decades had been active in public affairs. He was a member of Moravian Falls school board for a number of years. He was owner of one of the best orchards in Wilkes and over a long period of time had spent part of his time as a fruit tree salesman, selling many trees in Wilkes and several other northwestern North Carolina counties.

Sunday Found To Be The Hottest October Day On Record Here

Statesville — Sunday, October 5, was the hottest October day on record at Piedmont Experiment Station in the past fourteen years, the mercury climbing to 94 degrees Sunday afternoon. The highest reading Saturday, October 4, was 92 degrees, the records kept by Mr. J. W. Hendricks show. In Charlotte, where the mercury climbed to 95, there were thousands of soldiers literally stewing in winter uniforms.

Wilkes Will Send Thirty Men To Ft. Bragg On Nov. 12

Each Wilkes Board Receives Call For 15 Men For Service In Army

Wilkes will send thirty men to Fort Bragg for induction into the army on November 12, according to official notification received today by both boards.

Board number one will send 15 and board number two will send the same number. The men will leave here by bus at 10:34 a. m.

The calls for the two boards this month totaled 36 but the boards had only 19 men available and were short 17 men. This number, it is understood, will be added to future calls as the calls are made out by state headquarters.

Hartley Awarded \$13,350 In Consent Judgment In Court

Represents Payment For The Parkway Lands On Tompkins Knob Near Here

Frank J. Hartley was awarded a consent judgment in Wilkes court this week in the amount of \$13,350 against the state highway commission in payment for Blue Ridge Parkway lands on Tompkins Knob near Deep Gap.

Thus ended a lengthy piece of litigation which twice had made its way to the Supreme Court.

The first trial was before the commission and a jury awarded Hartley \$22,000. This was rejected by the commission and a superior court case was instituted. In 1939 the case ended in a mistrial when the jury failed to agree upon a figure as payment for the land.

Last year the case was tried in Wilkes court and the jury agreed upon \$20,000. The case went to the supreme court by appeal of the highway commission and was returned for a new trial.

During the process of trial in Wilkes court this week the commission and Hartley agreed upon \$13,500 and the case was ended. Consent judgment was signed by Judge J. A. Rousseau, of this city, who is presiding over court.

The lands involved include the summit of Tompkins Knob, which is the highest point on the Blue Ridge north of Grandfather mountain and is excellent grazing lands. Much land was taken for the Parkway right of way and scenic easements, including an area for a recreation development.

Other cases in which judgments have been rendered include: Thomas A. Jennings versus Howard Minton, plaintiff recovers \$250.

W. H. Davis versus Lloyd Lyons and others, plaintiff recovers \$75. C. C. Caudill versus W. L. Gatling, plaintiff recovers \$150.

J. M. Crawford versus Godley Brothers and others, plaintiff recovers \$300.

Mrs. Alice Miller versus Charlie Shumate and others, plaintiff recovers \$58.

G. D. Hinson versus A. L. Brown and Ted Brown, plaintiff recovers \$300.

The court, now in the second week, has disposed of more cases than are usually tried during a civil term.

Engineers In Field Making Surveys Of Dam Site On Yadkin Near City

Prevette, chairman of the Wilkes committee of the Western North Carolina Industrial council, who has been active in effort to secure flood control.

A. L. Brunson, chief engineer, of Charleston, was here Wednesday with a party of engineers, who will immediately do additional surveying of the proposed dam site at the Mck Moore farm one mile west of Wilkesboro and possibly another site further up the river.

School Building Plans Here Will Be Drawn Soon

Coffey and Olson Firm Employed To Make Preliminary Plans, Estimates

Board of education of North Wilkesboro in session Wednesday employed Clarence P. Coffey, of the architect firm of Coffey and Olson, Lenoir, to draw preliminary plans and make cost estimates on school building needs for North Wilkesboro.

This move is in coordination with the county authorities, who have employed architects to make plans and cost estimates for all school building needs in the county system.

While no definite plans have been made for badly needed school facilities here, it is understood that the plans when formulated will include a new building and improvements to present buildings.

Local plans, with those for the county system, will be drawn up on a basis of present and immediate future needs and will be included in a survey of needed public works being collected as a part of the Federal Works Agency for future reference as well as for immediate construction of the most vital needs.

Local Red Cross Leaders Meeting Held On Tuesday

Plans Made For Successful Roll Call In Wilkes County In November

At a meeting of local Red Cross leaders held at the city hall on Tuesday afternoon, Mrs. Catherine Stewart, Red Cross Field Representative from Asheville, assisted in making plans for the Wilkes County Red Cross Roll Call, November 11-19. Among those in attendance at the meeting were J. H. Whicker, Dr. J. W. Kincheloe, Jr., Rev. Watt M. Cooper, Dr. J. C. Stokes, R. G. Finley, Blair Gwyn, Mrs. J. A. Rousseau, Miss Rebecca Mosley, Mrs. W. R. Absher and Miss Nonie Gordon.

Twenty-one hundred members were set as tentative goal for the Roll Call this year. Two years ago Wilkes county was forty-ninth in the state with reference to the number of Red Cross members in proportion to its population. Last year it dropped to one hundred and thirteenth place—or eighth from the lowest percentage in the state. Local leaders are making plans to give Wilkes county a better Red Cross rating this present year.

Key people in many communities throughout Wilkes county are to be asked to give of their time in helping enroll those of their communities. A large group will be organized to canvass North Wilkesboro and Wilkesboro. It is hoped by local leaders that the Wilkes County Annual Red Cross Roll Call will meet with hearty response and cooperation on the part of all citizens of the county.

New Bridge Open

The new bridge across the Yadkin at the eastern end of this city has been completed and is open for travel.

The approaches have not been surfaced but the bridge will be open until the approach fills are conditioned by travel for paving.

Architects Work On Estimates For School Buildings

Benton and Coffey Survey Sites and Will Present Tentative Plans

Representatives of two architect firms have almost completed preliminary surveys of Wilkes county school building needs, it was learned today from the office of the county board of education.

Charles C. Benton, Jr., of Wilson, and Clarence P. Coffey, of Lenoir, have surveyed sites for proposed buildings and additions in practically every major district in the county and will soon be ready to submit preliminary plans and cost estimates.

At a joint meeting of the county board of education, county commissioners, School Superintendent C. B. Eller and members of the North Wilkesboro board of education the entire system was reviewed and a survey of needs throughout the county system was presented.

At that time the architects mentioned above were employed to prepare estimates.

It has been learned from authoritative sources that an election is planned for submitting a bond issue to the people, probably within the next few months, to obtain money to finance the school building program.

A. H. Casey, county attorney, has been asked by the board of commissioners to investigate the matter of calling a bond issue election.

Colored Woman Killed By Auto

Ira Gilreath's Wife Steps In Path Of Car Driven By Albert Church

Lilly Gilreath, wife of Ira Gilreath, colored resident of near Wilkesboro, was almost instantly killed Wednesday evening, seven o'clock, when she was hit by a car driven by Albert Church on highway 16 and 18 between Wilkesboro and Moravian Falls.

Coroner I. M. Myers empaneled a jury and an inquest was held this morning. The jury, composed of W. B. McNeil, H. M. Blankenship, B. F. Culler, W. B. Warner, S. F. Mastin and R. A. Greer, rendered a verdict saying the accident was unavoidable on the part of Church and he was exonerated.

Mrs. Floretta Davis, eye witness who lives near the scene of the accident, said the colored woman, who was on her way to a church service, stepped from a side road into the path of the car traveling toward Wilkesboro. Church stopped the car and picked up the woman but she was dead by the time they reached the hospital. Her body was badly broken.

Church, who was accompanied by a brother, lives between Wilkesboro and Oakwoods. He formerly lived on Gordon Hill west of this city.
