The bride wore a handsome wedding dress of ivory chiffon velvet fashioned with fitted bodice, sweetheart neckline and full buttoned at the wrist. Her veil of imported silk lace fell in soft folds to the waistline from a coronet of lace and tuberoses. She carried a prayer book published in 1872 which belonged to her great-grandmother. The prayer book was covered in ivory velvet and had a cluster of gardenias showered with tuberoses.

The maid of honor wore a gown of delft blue chiffon velvet fashioned after the bride's dress. The sweetheart neckline was adorned in blue Chantilly lace, and she wore a toque of the same material as the gown. Her flowers were pink chrysanthemums and roses. Immediately following the ceremony, a dinner was given at the Langston Restaurant. Places were laid for twenty-five guests. The centerpiece was a three-tier wedding cake, flaked by pink and white chrysanthemums. Following the dinner, the bride and groom left for a wedding trip to Palm Beach and Miami. For traveling, the bride wore an autumn green beeline suit with British tan accessories. Her shoulder bouquet was gardenias. After October 25th they will be at home at 716 Langston Court, Orlando.
