"AN ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$37,000 ROAD AND BRIDGE REFUNDING BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WILKES, NORTH CAROLINA BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF WILKES, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That bonds of said County for the maximum aggregate amount of \$37,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended for the purpose of refunding valid existing indebtedness incurred for roads and bridge purposes of said County evidenced by the following outstanding bonds:

\$11,000 5 1-2 per cent Road Bonds dated April 12, 1919 and payable April 12, 1942.

\$3,000 5 1-2 per cent Road and Bridge Bonds dated May 1, 1922 and payable May 1, 1942.

\$10,000 4 3-4 per cent Road Bonds dated November 1, 1916 and payable November 1, 1941.

\$9,000 6 per cent Road Bonds dated November 15, 1921 and payable November 15, 1941.

\$4,000 5 per cent Road and Bridge Bonds dated December 1, 1924 and payable December 1, 1941.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds herein authorized when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the County debt has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this order shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters."

The foregoing order was finally passed on the 6th day of October, 1941, and was first published on the 25th day of September, 1941. Any action or proceedings questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

Court Disposes Of Many Cases

Civil Docket Relieved Of Large Number Cases During Term

The term of court which closed last week in Wilkesboro was the means of disposing of a larger number of Civil cases than any term in recent years.

Many cases of long standing, some of them major civil actions, were settled by trial or consent judgement during the two-weeks term, over which Judge J. A. Rousseau, of this city, presided.

The next term of Wilkes court will convene on December 8, instead of in November, as formerly. The 1941 legislature made a new schedule of courts for Wilkes. The December term is designated for trial of either criminal or civil cases and will be for two weeks.

Under the new law a three-weeks mixed term will be held in January.

"AN ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$15,000 SCHOOL REFUNDING BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WILKES, NORTH CAROLINA.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Wilkes, as follows:

Section 1. That bonds of said County for the maximum aggregate amount of \$15,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, for the purpose of refunding valid existing indebtedness of said County which was incurred by said County as an administrative agency of the State for providing the uniform State system of public schools for the six months' term as required by the Constitution of North Carolina, and which is evidenced by the following outstanding bonds of said County:

\$3,000 5 1-2 per cent School Funding Bonds dated July 2, 1923 and payable July 2, 1942.

\$10,000 5 per cent School Funding Bonds dated February 1, 1931 and payable February 1, 1942.

\$2,000 6 per cent School Bonds dated December 1, 1936 and payable December 1, 1941.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds herein authorized when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the County debt has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this order shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters."

The foregoing order was finally passed on the 6th day of October, 1941, and was first published on the 25th day of September, 1941. Any action or proceedings questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

The contest sponsored by the Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation, Sand Springs, Oklahoma was open to all bona fide Home Demonstration Club women in the county who had not previously won first place in a county contest for which the company had furnished rings.

Exhibits consisting of 1 quart fruit, 1 quart vegetables, and 1 quart meat were displayed by these club members at the various club meetings during the month of September.

The County awards to the winners will be 1 doz. Kerr quart jars. The State awards are as follows: 1st. prize, \$20.00; 2nd. prize, \$15.00; 3rd. prize, \$10.00; 4th. prize, \$3.00; 5th. prize, \$2.00.

The purpose of the contest was two-fold: First, to cooperate more fully with the United States Department of Agriculture and Federal, State and County Extension Workers, and to encourage better and more home canning for a practical live-at-home program among Home Demonstration Club members in North Carolina. 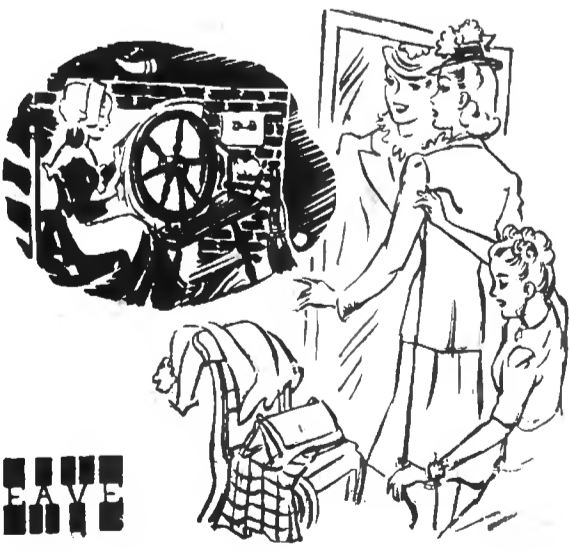
