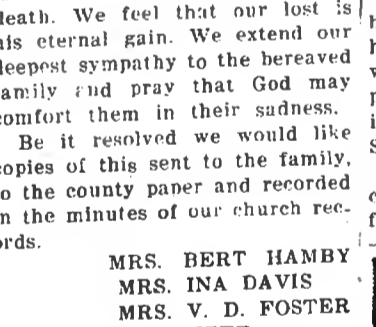
J. O. Brewer Hurt By Cow Saturday
