Fort Bragg.-Fort Bragg, the nation's largest artillery post, today exceeded the 60,000 mark in population, counting units of this cost which are on maneuvers. The Field Artillery Replacemen Center, largest in these United States, led in individual units with a total population of 16,637.

The recapitulation shows the strength of 60.218 divided unevenly between the commissioned and enlisted personnel with the men's 57.036 dwarfing the officer's 3,132. These figures show striking contrast with those of 1939 which gave the breakdown as 109 officers and 2,985 men.
