**Over 60,000 Men At Fort Bragg**

Fort Bragg.—Fort Bragg, the nation's largest artillery post, today exceeded the 60,000 mark in population, counting units of this post which are on maneuvers. The Field Artillery Replacement Center, largest in these United States, led in individual units with a total population of 16,637.

The recapitulation shows the strength of 60,218 divided unevenly between the commissioned and enlisted personnel with the men's 57,036 dwarfing the officer's 3,132. These figures show striking contrast with those of 1939 which gave the breakdown as 109 officers and 2,985 men.

**Merit Exams To Be Held Again**

With one set of examinations just over, the Merit System Council today announced new examinations to be given for professional positions under the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare and the County Welfare Departments.

According to Dr. Frank T. de Vyver, Merit System Supervisor, the new examinations will be given for the following positions: Director of Public Assistance; Supervisor of Personnel and County Organization; Supervisor of Staff Development; Supervisor CCC Selection; Supervisor of Standards and Procedures; Director of Field Social Work Representative; Chief Auditor; Consultant on Negro Welfare; Publicity Clerk; Public Welfare Nurse; Case Work Supervisor; Aide; Child Welfare Case Worker; Senior Case Worker; Case Work and Supervisor; Child Welfare Case Worker; Director Division of Child Welfare; Supervisor of Child Welfare Services; Case Consultant and Student Training Supervisor; Child Superintendent of Public Welfare; County Superintendent of Public Welfare; Director, Division Surplus Commodities Distribution; and Assistant Director, Division Surplus Commodities Distribution.

Mailed applications for these examinations must be postmarked before midnight on November 9, 1941. Applicants must be citizens of the United States, or must have made application for citizenship, in order to compete in these examinations. Applicants must also meet the minimum qualifications for the positions for which they apply. All applications must be made on the official application forms, which may be obtained from Dr. Frank T. de Vyver, Box 2328, Durham, N. C.

The examinations which were given on Saturday, October 11, were for clerical positions under the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, the County Welfare Departments, the State Board of Health, the local units, the State Commission for the Blind, and the Unemployment Compensation Commission. It is expected that the examinations will be graded and the registers

of eligibles established within a short time. Applicants are requested, however not to write for their grades, as this only slows up the process of grading the examinations.

Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock A. M., E. S. T., October 21, 1941, by the undersigned at its office in the city of Raleigh, N. C., for the following bonds of the county of Wilkes, North Carolina, dated October 1, 1941, and maturing on April 1 in the years hereinafter stated without option of prior payment:

\$37,000 Road and Bridge Refunding Bonds maturing annually \$7,000 1964 and \$10,000 1965 to 1967, inclusive.

\$15,000 School Refunding Bonds maturing annually \$6,000 1962, \$6,000 1963 and \$3,000 1964.

Denomination \$1,000; principal and interest (A & O) payable in lawful money in New York City; coupon bonds registerable as to principal only; general obligations; unlimited tax; delivery at place of purchaser's choice. There will be no auction.

A separate bid for each issue (not less than par and accrued interest) is required. Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding 6 percent in multiples of 1-4 of 1 percent; each bid may name one rate for part of the bonds of either issue (having the earliest maturities) and another rate for the balance, but no bid may name more than two rates for either issue, and each bidder must specify in his bid the amount of bonds of each rate. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder offering to purchase the bonds at the lowest interest cost to the county, such cost to be determined by deducting the total amount of the premium bid from the aggregate amount of interest upon the maturities. No bid for less than all of the bonds will be entertained.

Bids must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposal for Bonds" and be accompanied by a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company, payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer of North Carolina for \$1,040. The right to reject all bids is reserved. The approving opinion of Messrs. Stacey, Thorndyke, Palmer and Dodge, Boston, Mass., will be furnished the purchaser.

In the event that prior to the delivery of the bonds the income received by private holders from bonds of the same type and character shall be taxable by the terms of any Federal income tax law, the successful bidder may, at his election, be relieved of his obligations under the contract to purchase the bonds and, in such case, the deposit accompanying his bid will be returned.
