The convention, which is put on each Halloween under auspices of the school, attracted \$164.90 in gate receipts, setting a new record. The sheriff's staff and highway patrol cooperated in handling traffic in the vicinity.

Sixty dollars in cash prizes were awarded. The first prize of \$30 for the best string band went to Mountain Ramblers, of Lenoir, led by Carl Story, Alonzo Black's band from Ashe took second, \$15, and third, \$6, went to Uncle Henry's Wildcats, of Hickory.

Three dollars each were given winners for violin, guitar and banjo. Alonzo Black was the fiddlin' winner, Bill Caudill with guitar and Bill Miller for banjo picking.

There were entries from 100-mile radius, giving evidence that the convention is growing every year.

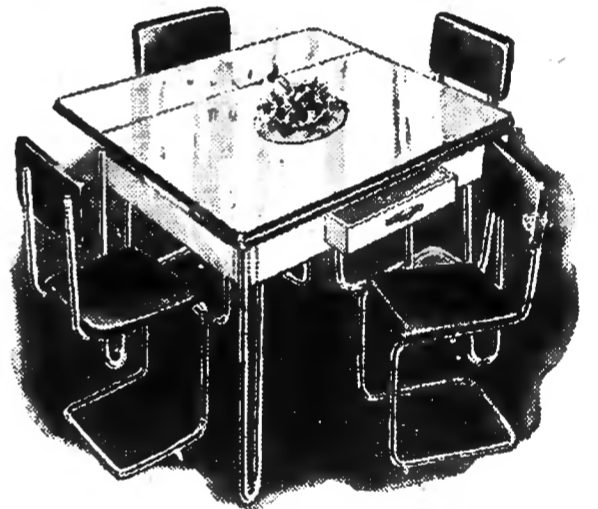

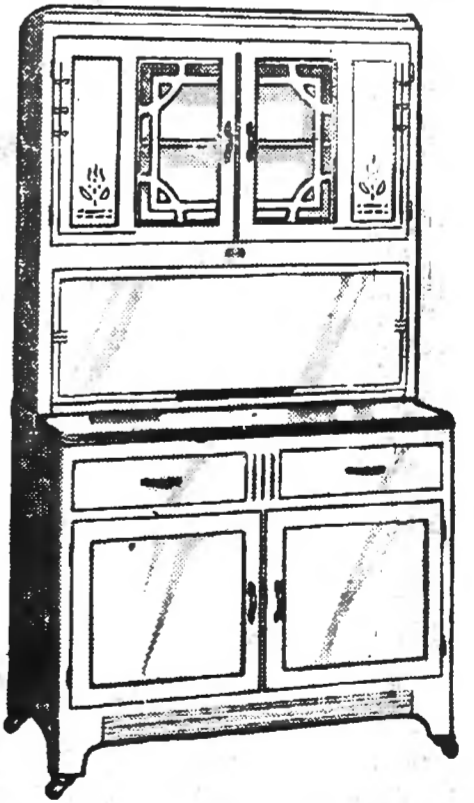
