Food Not High Priced In Paris

Paris, Occupied France, Nov. 7.—(delayed) — Paris housewives who maintained a barrage of complaints throughout last winter are in a better mood this fall.

Potatoes, their chief worry, now are obtainable regularly at the rate of two pounds daily for a family of five. The price is about two and one fourth cents a pound.

Fresh eggs are four and one-fourth cents each.

Milk, supplied only to children, old people and those with a doctor's certificate, is four and one-half cents per quart and butter is 40 cents a pound. Lamb is 28 cents a pound.

These prices converted at the nominal rate of 50 francs to the dollar, should be considered in the light of the basic wage for factory workers in the Paris area, economists said. The basic wage is the equivalent of about \$32 monthly, to which may be added the amount a wife and mother may draw from the national family fund in the Paris area this comes to \$12 monthly for a mother with three children.
