## THROUGH CLUBS—Women Active In Defense Work

Washington. — The 2,000,000 members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, who are already doing a big job in civilian defense, are thrilled that the nation's First Lady, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, will preside at the Forum on Civilian Defense which will be a part of the annual mid-winter meeting of the Board of Directors of the Federation, to be held in Washington, D. C., January 23-26. Participating in the forum will be five of Mrs. Roosevelt's co-workers in the Office of Civilian Defense: Miss Eloise Davison, Assistant Director; Miss Jane Seaver, Youth Member of the Volunteer Participation Committee; Miss Wilmer Shields, of the Community Volunteer Service; L. D. Gasser, Brigadier General, U. S. Army retired, War Department Member of the Board for Civilian Protection; and James P. Kirby, Chief of the Press Relations Section.

Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, president of the Federation, who has projected one of the most vital and inclusive defense programs offered by any volunteer group in the country, will preside at all sessions, and will offer ample opportunity for the fourteen committees serving under the Department of National Defense to be heard. Mrs. Gustav Ketterer, of Philadelphia, is chairman of this department.

The startling shortcomings of the nation's health which have been uncovered by the selective draft, give additional significance to the Forum on defense of Our Health, at which the Honorable Paul V. McNutt, Director of the Office of Defense Health and Welfare Service, has been asked to preside. Speaking on this Forum will be Dr. Thomas Parran, Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service; Major General James C. Magee, Surgeon General of the War Department; Rear Admiral Ross T. McIntire, Surgeon General of the United States Navy; and Nathan Straus, Administrator of the United States Housing Authority. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, will speak on the Defense of Americanism. Additional forums will be held on Military Defense, the Defense of Our Economic System and the Defense of the Western Hemisphere.

One thousand club leaders from every state in the Union will attend this meeting. Tea at the White House is scheduled, also parliamentary law classes conducted by Mrs. Henry S. Robert, former President-General of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and public speaking classes conducted by Mrs. Hugh Butler, a successful teacher of public speaking.

## 10-Year-Old Roaring Gap Bill Is Paid

Raleigh. — The state highway and public works commission go-paid Friday for a road it built in the Roaring Gap summer resort development more than ten years ago.

Commission funds totaling \$4,571.91 were spent in employing state workers and using state materials in building the road, Highway Chairman Ben Prince said.

After making several vain attempts to collect the bill, commission officials had virtually

forgotten the matter, Chairman Ben Prince didn't even know about it until a few weeks ago, the road was built many years before he became highway chairman.  
 Dr. Frederick James, head of the Duke Hospital at Durham, called on Prince yesterday and presented him with a check for \$2,372.91 and a claim for \$2,200 he said was due the Roaring Gap Corporation for a road taken over by the commission.

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
