U. S. Industry Beats Reich's Total 3 To 1, Manufacturers Are Told

New York.—The United States, operating "under a free competitive enterprise system," has in little more than a year "reached a production stage that it took German industry, under a dictatorship, from three to five years to reach," the national Association of Manufacturers was told at the closing dinner of its three day meeting.

K. T. Keller, president of the Chrysler corporation, which now has the world's largest tank arsenal, told the delegates that "one day's production from all tank plants in this country exceeds the total number of tanks built in the United States during the World War. Chrysler's arsenal alone, he said, is turning out more tanks in a month than were produced in this country during the whole of the World War."

Sees Threat

Thurman Arnold, assistant U. S. Attorney General, saw this difficulties in which he cited the production threatened by labor two-fold problem of insuring that the defense program not be impeded by failure of mediation in labor disputes and the necessity for protecting "independent businessmen and consumers against extortion in a time of rising prices."

PIPE FALLS ON HIM—Barney Call Is Badly Injured

Local Man Is Hurt While Working On Oil Pipe Line Near Kannapolis

Critically injured while employed at laying an oil pipeline near Kannapolis, Barney Call, aged about 30, was reported somewhat improved today at the Cabarrus Hospital.

Call, whose home address was listed as North Wilkesboro, and D. L. Curry, also about 30 years old, of Hayworth, Oklahoma, were admitted to the hospital about 4:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The attending physician said Call had several ribs fractured on his right side and had probably suffered some injury to the brain. His condition was termed critical.

Less seriously hurt, Curry was treated for abdominal injuries and was kept in the hospital for observation.

Information concerning the mishap was meager but it was understood at the hospital that a huge section of the pipe being laid in that section by the Plantation Oil Company, and intended eventually to pour oil into the eastern states—fell on the two workers. The pipe reportedly weighs about 400 pounds to the foot.

The men were carried to the hospital by truck.
