

## Shorter Term Enlistments In Naval Reserve

Raleigh.—For the first time since World War I, enlistments are now authorized for a period of two, three or four years in all classes of the naval reserve, except station flight training and reserve officers' training.

Lt. Commander McFarland W. Wood, officer in charge of Navy recruiting in the Carolinas, has been instructed by the Navy Department to accept reservists for two, three or four years enlistments, and they will be required to serve on active duty only throughout the duration of the national emergency which now exists.

In the past, Commander Wood pointed out, all reservists had to enlist for four years. Aviation cadets and midshipmen must still enlist for four years, and regular navy recruits sign for six years.

"The change is designed to increase recruiting in connection with the navy's drive for men to operate the two-ocean Navy being constructed," the officer explained.

Numerous naval service schools are available to those who desire to learn an interesting, profitable trade, such as: radio, aviation machinist, electrician, metal smith, machinist, storekeeper, clerical, pharmacists mate and other specialties.

"The Navy now offers fast promotion, excellent training, travel, free clothing, subsistence and lodging, dental and medical care. These opportunities, with good pay, are well worth investigating. All men between the ages of 17 and 49 inclusive are invited to visit the nearest Navy recruiting station for further information."

Charleston.—Navy headquarters for the sixth and seventh districts issued a call here today for men between the ages of 17 and 50 who are qualified as typists, stenographers or both typists and stenographers.

The volunteers will enlist as yeomen with ratings offered depending on professional qualifications. Men who enlist in this branch of the service receive from \$60 to \$90 per month depending on their rating and are provided with living quarters and meals, or additional allowances if not stationed on a naval reservation.

Volunteers must be in good health and the enlistment in the Naval Reserve will be for four years with the obligation to report for active duty as the Navy needs their services.

Men enlisted in the reserve are not subject to military training as prescribed under the selective service act. An original uniform and medical facilities are furnished at no cost to the volunteer.

Those men interested in this branch of the Naval service should write to Captain A. G. Howe, USN (Retired) Box 147, Charleston, S. C. This letter should state typing speed, rate of taking dictation, age, number of dependents, present position and rate of pay.

Harvey Shore liquor conspiracy case. His first trial on the perjury count is scheduled for the Winston-Salem federal court in May.

The letter of resignation by Beshears, addressed to J. M. Horne, division superintendent of prison camps, follows:

"I am herewith tendering to you my resignation as superintendent of the Wilkes county prison camp to take effect immediately. I am doing this for the reason that there is a charge pending against me in the United States District Court, of which I am absolutely innocent.

"But while this charge is pending, and until I can have my trial to vindicate myself, I feel out of fairness to the prison authorities, the state, myself, and everyone concerned, that I should resign, pending charges against me.

"Thanking you for past favors and with every good wish for the successful operation of the prison camp."

## Planned District Program

1. Monthly meeting of district committees (with Scout executive or assistant present).
2. Monthly round-table of Scout masters, Skippers and Cub masters. (With Scout executive or assistant present).
3. Monthly meeting of court of Review and court of honor.
4. Organization of new Scout troops and new Cub packs. (By the Organization and Extension committee).
5. Reregister all present troops and packs. (By Commissioners).
6. Conduct at least one training course for Scout masters, one for Cub masters, one for all troop committees, and one for all Scouters in Health and Safety. (By leader training committee).
7. Organize and motivate every troop in district to have at least one week in approved camp. (By camping and activities committee).
8. Organize and motivate one Boy Scout Emergency Service Corps for the district.
9. Organize and hold at least one merit badge show or Scoutcraft demonstration, one district camporee and one Scout circus or street show. (By camping and activities committee).
10. Organize and conduct at least one community-wide Good Turn in each principal town. (By camping and activities committee).
11. The district committee to serve as a sub-station of the local Council and National Council.

12. The Scout executive and his assistants to inform, advise and encourage the various committees and commissioners to perform in their functions.

## A. H. Eller, Civic Business Leader, Succumbs at Home

Winston-Salem.—Adolphus Hill Eller, chairman of the trust committees and director of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company and a leading citizen of Winston-Salem for many years, died yesterday morning at 5 o'clock at his home, 127 Cascade avenue.

Mr. Eller had been confined to his home for several weeks due to illness. Death resulted from a heart attack.

Mr. Eller was born in Wilkes county, April 9, 1861, a son of James and Mary Carlton Eller. He was educated at Moravian Falls Academy and was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1885. He studied law at the Folks Law School at CH. N. C., and was admitted to the bar in 1886. He began his practice of law in Winston-Salem with the firm of Eller and Starbuck in 1888.

For many years Mr. Eller was an outstanding leader in the trust field. He became associated with the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company as trust officer in 1916. Later he became vice-president and trust officer and in 1936 was elected vice-president and chairman of the trust committee. He was active in the affairs of the trust company until a few weeks before his death when he was confined to his home on account of ill health.

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
