Strategic City Is Recaptured; Tanks Crushed

Moscow, Thursday.—The Red army announced today the recapture of the important city of Leningrad, final defeat of Colonel General Heinz Guderian's tank

army and routing of sixteen German divisions comprising six elite tank corps on the entire central front.

(Sixteen army divisions would total between 200,000 and 350,000 men.)

In addition, a special brigade of Hitler's black-shirted elite guards, flown to the front from Cracow, Poland, has been routed, a special communique said.

The Nazi invaders are fleeing westward under heavy blows of the pursuing Russians, abandoning military equipment and even their wounded as they seek to hasten their escape, the Soviet communique said.

The text:

"Our troops on the western front have occupied the town of Kaluga. General Guderian, has suffered defeat."

"After the rout near Tula of the second tank army under command of General Guderian, stubborn engagements resulted on the line of the rivers Nara, Protva and Oka."

IN RALEIGH—State Courses For War Work Needs

Raleigh—A new schedule of special courses designed to help fill the need for technically-trained men in the the nations war work will begin at State College soon, Director Edward W. Ruggles of the College Extension Division announced today.

The courses in engineering, science and management training are financed by the Federal government and the only cost to the student is his personal expenses. The program was started at State College a year ago, and hundreds of non-college men completing the courses have been placed in well-paying jobs essential to the nations victory drive.

Courses in the new schedule will vary from 10 to 20 weeks in length, Director Ruggles reported. High school graduation will be required of all applicants. A bulletin describing the courses may be secured from Director Ruggles, who said many applications from prospective students already had been received.

First course on the State College schedule will be ultra-high frequency techniques, starting Jan. 1. A course in diesel engineering is scheduled to start Jan. 19 and a course in radio communication will begin Feb. 9th.

All other courses are scheduled to start February 2. They follow: aircraft inspection, architectural engineering and drawing, chemical testing and inspection, defense production management, electrical distribution, engineering drawing, fabric testing and inspection, high temperature measurement and heat treatment, instrument men and topographers, production supervision and materials testing and inspection.

Men with training in liberal arts schools are eligible for the training, Director Ruggles said.

Two other courses will begin at Wake Forest College Feb. 2 under supervision of the State College agency. They will give training in surveying and engineering drawing.

Director Ruggles urged that men interested in any of the courses apply at once. Courses will be dropped from the schedule if an insufficient number of men apply, he said.
