

Ed Anderson Is Appointed to OPM Unit

Chapel Hill.—The OPM has appointed Ed M. Anderson, president of the North Carolina Press Association, to represent the industry on its important war-time pulp and paper advisory committee.

The OPM authorized William L. Daley of the National Editorial Association to make the announcement at the closing session of the annual state press institute here yesterday.

Mr. Anderson, who will serve without pay or expenses, announced that he would be happy to serve the newspaper industry, and planned to attend the committee's initial meeting in Washington Monday.

The popular young head of the association is publisher of three weekly papers, the Skyland Post, in West Jefferson, Allegheny News in Sparta, and Transylvania Times in Brevard.

A graduate of the University in 1926, he is a native of Reidsville, but removed to West Jefferson five years ago, and has become a prominent figure in the western section of the state.

He is also president of the Ashe county fair, chairman of the trustees of the county memorial hospital, secretary of the New River baseball league, and president of the Northwestern alumni of the Greater University of North Carolina.

IN THIS COUNTY— T.V.A. Farmers To Meet Jan. 21

Demonstration farmers are asked to meet in the County Agent's office on Wednesday afternoon January 21, at 2:00 o'clock for a meeting on Farm Record Books. Mr. H. B. James, Assistant Extension Farm Management Specialist, will be here to assist us in this work.

We have just completed working up requisitions for forty-two tons of T. V. A. phosphate for 17 demonstration farmers, and we are expecting this phosphate some time during the month of February.

At a recent meeting of the T. V. A. demonstration farmers in his office, the farmers stated that they were getting fine results from the use of this superphosphate, and would like to get this year's supply as early as possible.

In order to get the best results from this superphosphate, the farmers are requested to carry out a definite crop rotation and apply this material to their legumes and grasses. In addition to this, they are requested to keep strict farm records on the year's work, and to turn them in to the County Agent's office at the end of the year. Since these record books are now due, we hope that all T. V. A. demonstration farmers will be present for this meeting.

I assure you of my personal appreciation for your cooperation and friendship through every day that this war will last and 1942 will be the brightest year for you and yours.
