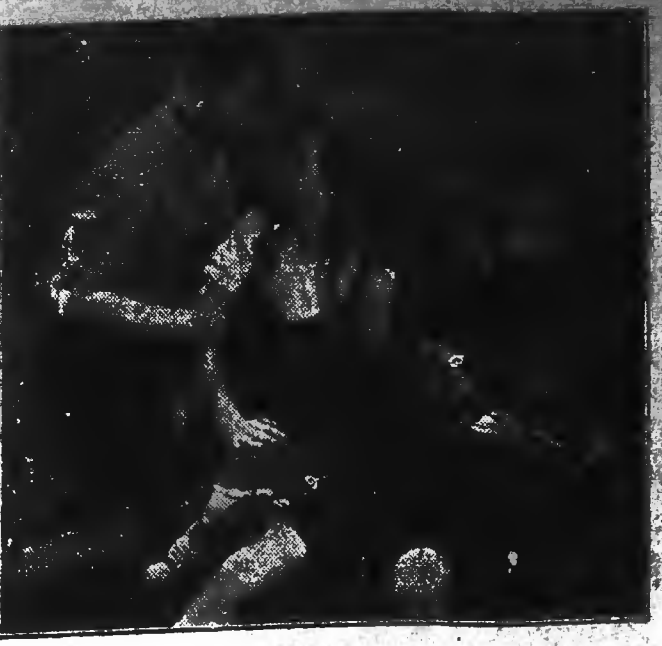
Pfc. Carl D. Johnson Gets Promotion
