Some of our deepest feelings as human beings were voiced by the eleven disciples of Jesus in their conversation with Him at the Last Supper. In the questions of Peter, Thomas, Phillip, and Judas (not Iscariot, not the traitor) we see the expression of these feelings, and Jesus answers every one of them. We shall think about these questions in our morning services between now and Easter. Next Sunday we shall consider the question of Peter, "Lord, dost Thou wash my feet?" Often we feel like Peter did then. We feel like singing in all humility: "Not worthy, Lord, to gather up the crumbs, with trembling hand, that from Thy table fall..."

But from Jesus' reply to Simon Peter we realize that we must go on to sing the next two lines, especially the last:

"A woe-begotten, heavy-laden sinner comes, to plead Thy promise and obey Thy call!"

At 7:15 p. m., Mr. T. C. McKnight, secretary of the Y.M.C.A. in Elkin, and an elder in the Presbyterian church, will speak to all the groups in our evening worship and study classes. War Stories Are Most Popular At Public Library

Miss Lisette Stone, librarian of the Wilkes County Public Library, reports that war stories are leading in popularity at present. She has a wide and varied selection of the latest books covering the war in the different theatres. She has two or three copies of several books of the same title which she finds necessary to meet the demand for this type of literature.

"Uncle Sam" by John Roy O'Sullivan, heads the list in popularity. This story deals with a young propagandist and saboteur of the Red organization who are attempting to invade and dupe the American people.

"Here Is Your War" by Ernie Pyle, the celebrated columnist, who is in Italy with the American forces at the war front. He writes interestingly and humorously, often heartbreakingly, of the actual happenings, and touches on the personal habits and eccentricities of our American boys from all sections of the country.

"We Thought We Heard the

Angels Singing" by James C. Whitaker. Mr. Whitaker was one of the Ricksbacker party who drifted for many days on a rubber mat after the plane in which the party was riding was forced down on the ocean. This book has a spiritual element which is stimulating and uplifting.

"God Is My Co-Pilot" by Robert L. Scott. Another splendid story of Christian faith and spirituality which is the direct result of the suffering and turmoil caused by the present war.

"Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo", by Ted W. Lawson. This book has been the most talked about of the entire war. The story was published in serial form in "Reader's Digest" several months ago and deals with the heroism and daring of the crew of flyers led by the famous military leader, Jimmy Doolittle, who flew over Tokyo shortly after Pearl Harbor.

These are only a few of the splendid books found on shelves of the Wilkes County Public Library. It is to the advantage of everyone to draw on this wonderful source of information, and to visit the library regularly for books.
