

ALLIES BEAT NAZIS' DOOR IN NORTH EUROPE

U. S. Flying Fortresses and Liberators, pacing a mighty pre-invasion aerial assault against the coast of Northern Europe by 1,500 Allied warplanes, yesterday heavily blasted the area of the great French port of Cherbourg and the bomb-scarred Pas De Calais region concentrated attacks on Nazi defense installations.

Five heavy bombers and one fighter were missing from the operations. No enemy fighter opposition was encountered, a communique said last night.

The daylong Allied aerial assault against the continental coast from Cherbourg to the Dutch ports followed powerful R. A. F. night attacks on the French rail hub of Aulnoye, 18 miles southeast of Valenciennes, and on military targets in the Lyons area and Western Germany.

McDonald Installed As Head Of NCEA

Raleigh, March 24.—The North Carolina Education Association today installed Dr. Ralph McDonald, of Winston-Salem, as president, Mrs. Annie Laurie McDonald, of Hickory, vice president, and Margery Alexander, of Charlotte, and Virginia Kirkpatrick, of Raleigh, as members of the board of directors.

Miss Kirkpatrick succeeds Dr. A. M. Proctor, of Durham and Miss Alexander succeeds J. H. Needles, of Salisbury. Mrs. McDonald defeated C. C. Linneman, of Durham.

Selection of the 1945 meeting place was left to the directors.

Commenting on teacher pay, Chairman Guy B. Phillips, of the state planning commission of the N.C.E.A., said he deemed it a dangerous practice to limit the reward of a really good teacher and that salary differentials should be commensurate with the value of service.

The attributes of a teacher, he said in his report, should include superior intelligence, scholarship, moral stamina, personality and health, with the elimination of the unfit as his or her inadequacy is revealed.

The growth and maturity of education in North Carolina, Phillips said, have proved the value of degree holders, and steps should be taken to prepare others of adequate potential value to succeed them upon termination of their services as teachers.

"As a basis for teacher selection and education, instructors of teachers should keep in close touch themselves with the needs of schools, by close association, and by actually teaching in the schools."

He also touched on the problem of consolidation, asserting that natural barriers must be overcome in transportation. Also, he said that sociological, economic and cultural advantages of consolidation were to be considered.

The report also recommended that a study be made of state aid in the erection of school buildings, and equipping them. Retiring President Horace Sisk, of Fayetteville, voiced his appreciation of the co-operation given him during his office.

Miss Jones Honored At Mars Hill College

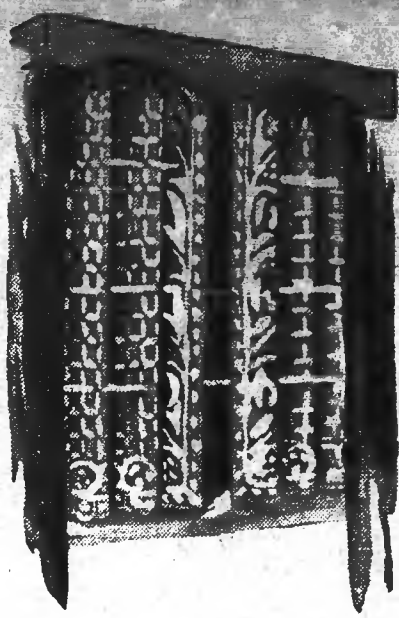

Marines Applaud Stunt Man's Fall

For once in his life, Dick Talmadge, veteran firm stunt man, received plaudits from the sidelines for a daring deed for which he alone received the credit, instead of the acclaim going to some actor for whom he might have been doubling.

In Walker Wanger's 'Gung Ho!' coming Thursday to the Allen theatre, Talmadge was elected to play a role by himself, as a Jap sniper on Makin Island, which Carlson's Marine Raiders annihilated and on which the picture is based.

During a disorderly retreat by the Japs through the jungle, pursued by Marine Raiders, Talmadge was a sniper atop a tall water tower. As the Raiders advanced, he was drawing a bead on Rod Cameron, also a raider, when Cameron spotted him.

Cameron let loose with fusillade. The water tank was punctured and water spurted out. Talmadge reeled atop the water tower, then plunged to earth 30 feet below—a dead "Jap".

So perfect was Talmadge's timing, his mid-air somersaults and his plunge to the ground that Director Ray Enright called it a "one-take" scene, and the entire company applauded Talmadge's stunt.
