Pvt. Joseph C. Miller, marine corps veteran of six major battles against the Japs, said in a recent letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Miller, of North Wilkes-Boro, that he has approximately 18 Japs to his credit.

Tvt. Miller's letter, under date March 2 from an undisclosed South Pacific location, was as fol-

"It has been a good while since I've written but I've been moving around a lot and haven't had the opportunity to get settled. imagine you understand how it was, judging from my last ex-

"I'm back in the South Pacific and expect to see more action promptly. I only hope my luck holds out as well as the last time I've already seen six major battles and came out without a scratch. I have approximately 18 Japs to my credit".

Below freezing temperatures this week have not materially endangered the prospects for a good apple crop on the Brushles and other apple producing areas in northwestern North Carolina, was the opinion expressed by agricultural authorities and orchardists today.

Apple trees were not near enough to the bloom stage to be badly damaged, according to opinions expressed by a number of fruit growers.

However, it was generally agreed that peach bloom was killed by the freeze. Reports from the sandhills peach producing area were to the effect that there may be no crop there this year.


