HISTORICAL SKETCH OF FOREST **FURNITURE COMPANY, THIS CITY**

(Editor's note: This article is being reprinted from "The Pulse tributed by officials and employes

of Forest Furniture company) In the late 17th and 18th centuries, the section of northwest and southern Virginia was settled largely with Scotch-Irish immigrants from western Pennsylvania and the valley of Virginia.

These settlers were stock raisers and settled along the water courses and tributaries. The Yadkin Valley was settled up with this class of citizens, who as they made money built nice homes on the higher lands with the best timber grown along on their boundaries, consisting of oak, walnut, wild cherry, chestnut. NAZIS PUT UP

Enemy - controlled broadcasts said last night that Anglo-American invasion troops had been massed at their embarkation points for the past eight days and that "all evidence points to the fact that the invasion of Western Europe will be launched sooner than some people expected".

The Paris radio commentator, Jean Paqui, said that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme Allied invasion chief, had concentrated 50 divisions—up to 750.000 men-and 80,000 paratroopers in Southern England for the Allied assault.

"A whole armada of transport vessels, merchantmen, fishing boats, invasion barges, motor torpedo boats and destroyers has been concentrated in the harbors of Southern England and especially in the Bristol area, although the whereacouts of the Allied High Sea Fleet has so far not been discovered", Paqui said, in a broadcast heard by the London Daily Telegraph.

British and Indian troops have smashed through the German stronghold of Pignataro at the mouth of the historic Liri Valley four miles southwest of Cassino and last night were moving across the valley against furious enemy resistance in an effort to sever Cassino's road and rail communications with Rome.

Russian bombers, in their sixth successive night raid on enemy bases, attacked the White Russian capital of Minsk and two rail junctions in Eastern Poland Tuesday night, while yesterday Red Army ground forces scored limited gains in Southeastern Poland and along the Lower Dneister River of Bessarabia, Moscow announced today.

Striking along a 225-mile aerial front, the Russians lost only three operation in 29 nights. At one bombers in their 21st major target, the rail junction of Chelm in Eastern Poland, fires visible more than 62 miles were set among German railroad cars and military stores. The third target was the rail junction of Baranowicze. 78 miles southwest of Minsk and 177 miles northeast of Chelm.

The daily Moscow operational bulletin which announced the air attacks said that for the 26th day there were no important changes on the major eastern war fronts. It reported that in Tuesday's minor actions the Russians wrecked nine enemy tanks and shot down 29 planes.
