## Facts About Your Social Security Account Number

Your Social Security card is the key to your Social Security account which is kept for you by the government. It is one of the most valuable things that you own, and should be preserved with the same care that you use in protecting your insurance policy, your war bonds, and other valuable papers.

The Social Security Board suggests that the two parts of the card be separated. Put the lower half in your safety-deposit box or in some other place where it will be secure and where you can get it if needed. Carry the upper half with you when you are applying for a new job or when you go to work on a new job. If you will wrap this part of the card in oiled paper or cellophane and carry it in the card compartment of your bill fold, it will last you many years.

Since it costs both money and time to issue duplicate cards, and since both money and time are

precious, especially in wartime, you are urged to do everything you can to prevent loss of your card. If you do lose it, however, take the lower half to the Social Security Board and request a duplicate of your complete card. Even if you have lost both parts you can get a duplicate. You should be sure to ask for such a duplicate instead of a new number, because you never need but one number, no matter how many different places you may work. The issuance of more than one number would cause your account to be divided and might, in the end, mean a loss of benefits to you or your family.

A woman who changes her name by marriage or divorce should present her card to the Social Security Board and get a card in her own name, with the same number.
