LIVESTOCK

Our livestock program is making progress with the time and our farmers are beginning to see results of the livestock program which we have been working on for the past several years. Approximately 40 purebred bulls have been placed with the farmers throughout the county during the past four years and the offsprings from these bulls are proving to be superior to their dams. Starting with the purebred campaign was naturally slow but it is the soundest and cheapest method of getting better livestock. Many farmers with these bulls have stated that their purebred bulls are driving out the scrub bulls which is a good sign that the farmers are interested in better livestock. We have a number of farmers and some 4-H Club members who would like to take another forward step, that is, to develop a purebred herd. With this in mind, we are going to try to bring in some purebred females from time to time in order that we might get more purebred herds started. The first of these sales will be held at the old fair ground Saturday, June 17, at 2:00 p. m. Sixteen purebred Jersey heifers will

be offered in a non-profit auction sale and the farmers and club members who are interested in developing a small purebred herd should take advantage of the offering of this sale. This is a non-profit sale made possible by the Cobble Dairy Company. We are told that the cattle on the Guernsey and Jersey islands where two of our major dairy breeds originated, will all be killed for food before the war is over. Therefore, it seems reasonable to think that dairy cattle for restocking these islands will have to come from other sections of the country. Farmers who start developing a purebred herd now should be in position to help restock many of our cattle countries in the future.

In addition to the hundreds of farmers in the county who are selling manufactured milk to the Cobble Dairy Company we now have 10 Grade A producers compared to only four three years ago. There are others who plan to go into Grade A production as soon as they can build their herds large enough so that it will justify them to do so.
