SHOES - Airplane stamps No. 1 and No. 2 (Book 3) valid indefinitely.

GASOLINEin A book good for three gallons became effective May 9 and will expire August 8.

SUGAR-Sugar stamps No. 30 and No. 31, (book 4) good for five pounds indefinitely. Stamp No. 32 becomes good indefinitely June 16 for five

CANNING SUGAR - Sugar stamp No. 40 good for five pounds of canning sugar until February 28, 1945.

CANNING SUGAR - Home Canning Sugar for the second period applications are to be made as follows:

1. Persons who have not obtained any sugar for home canning since March 1, 1944, may apply for the amount needed during the canning season, not to exceed 20 pounds per person.

2. Persons who have obtained sugar for home canning since March 1, 1944, may apply for the amount needed during the canning season, not to exceed 20 pounds per person.

2. Persons who have obtained sugar for home canning since March 1, 1944, but not a sufficient amount for their needs during the entire 1944 canning season, may apply again at the same board for the amount needed, not to exceed the difference between 20 pounds and the amount previously obtained. In this case "SPARE" stamp No. 37 need not be submitted, but the consumer must state on the back of the application whether he has used the sugar previously granted for canning or preserving fruits and vegetables for home use, and if not whether he (1) still has the coupons issued to him, or (2) still has the sugar obtained with the coupens.

Liberator bombers dropped 23 tons of explosives on the airdrome on Palau Island and shot down or probably destroyed 28 of 50 Japanese interceptors which battled the raiders in their fourth successive day of attacks against the enemy's important Carolines Island base, it was announced today.

Gradually increasing the weight of their attacks against Palau. 1200 miles west of Truk and only 595 miles north of American positions on Blak Island, the farranging Southwest Pacific bombers destroyed "many additional" Japanese aircraft on the ground at Polilu airdrome, General Doug-MacArthur's communique

The raid apparently was a follow-up to an earlier Sunday attack reported in yesterday's communique and the sixth separate attack carried out since last Thursday.

Twenty of the Japanese planes challenging the Liberators were definitely shot down and eight others probably destroyed, Mac-Arthur's communique said.

NAZI FOOD SUPPLIES IN

American forces driving up the Tyrrhenean coast of italy have captured Orbetello, center of German resistance to the Fifth Army's offensive, and gained control of the enemy's immense food supply dumps on the nearby Orbetello peninsula (Mt. Argentario) field dispatches disclosed last night.

Sid Feder, Associate Press correspondent with the Fifth Army, said in a story filed from Orbetello that the whole mountainous peninsula with tremendous hidden stores of food had come under Allied control. His dispatch followed an announcement by Allied headquarters that the junction of highways one and 74, a short distance north of Orbetello along the coast of the mainland, had also been captured.

The Americans were pressing forward and engaging a strong force of Nazis in the hills north of the road junction, Feder said.

Sales "E" Bonds In May Totalled Almost \$38.000

Regular War Bond Organization Cooperating In Fifth War Loan

Sales of war bonds in Wilkes county for the month of May totaled \$37,947.25, a report received by J. R. Hix, war bond chairman, from the Federal Reserve system, stated.

Mr. Hix said today that his organization, which continually promotes sale of war bonds, is cooperating with the Fifth War Loan, of which W. D. Halfacre is chairman, and all efforts are coordinated toward reaching the quota of \$990,000 for the cam-

Of the \$990,000 quota for the Fifth War Loan, \$227,000 is required in "E" bonds, the smaller bonds purchased by individuals. If the county exceeds the total by as much as ten per cent, and reaches the "E" bond quota, Wilkes will be given recognition by the county's name being place ed on a plaque on a landing craft.

All Parts of War Loan Campaign Organization Are Now Functioning Well

Sales of war bonds for the first three days of the Fifth War Loan in Wilkes county passed the \$100,-000 mark, W. D. Halfacre, chairman, reported today.

Although that amount is only a fraction of the quota of \$990,000 it is a good start, Mr. Halfacre said, and much interest is being shown, as evidenced by the number of inquiries relative to the different types of bonds offered in the campaign.
