

# Careful Budgeting Fuel Oil Is Urged By Board

Careful budgeting of fuel oil rationing throughout the heating season was urged today by Chairman J. L. Wells, of the Fuel Oil Panel of War Prices and Rationing Board, announcing that rations must last until August 31, 1945. The 1944-45 heating season begins September 1.

Continued conservation of fuel oil is just as necessary now as it was two years ago, Mr. Wells said. "Now, at the beginning of the heating season, when tanks are full, oil should be used carefully," Mr. Wells said. "Householders should not be wasteful. The last days of the heating season may be the coldest."

OPA this year is providing to each fuel oil user a booklet—"Ration Calendar and Delivery Record"—with his ration coupons. If you did not receive yours you may obtain one from your fuel oil dealer or from the War Price and Rationing Board.

"This booklet should be kept handy and used as a guide," the board chairman said. "It contains valuable information showing how much oil should have been burned at any time during the heating year."

"This ration calendar is easy to use," Mr. Wells continued. "All that is needed is to know the percent of the heating season that has passed. This information can be obtained from the local board or from this newspaper, or from fuel oil dealers. It will also be announced weekly over the radio. After this information is at hand, a householder should figure out the amount of oil he has already burned during the current season. Compare this figure with the total which the booklet shows should have been burned at this particular percent of the season."

"If the chart shows that too much oil is being burned, cut down immediately. If, on the contrary, a surplus is shown, the householder shouldn't get careless. That extra oil should be saved for the time when it will be needed for the unseasonable cold days that are sure to come."

"If a householder also burns fuel oil to heat water, his ration includes oil for next summer's hot water heating. This should be kept in mind and the necessary coupons earmarked. If this isn't done, next summer may be one of cold water exclusively."

"Householders who deposit their coupons with their dealers should keep careful delivery records. Help out dealers by keeping track of the number of gallons delivered, the number of coupons still valid during the period, the amount of oil burned and the amount remaining in the tank. Oil in tanks should be allowed to run low before reordering, so that the dealer can supply householders with as few trips as possible. When orders are placed, they should be for as much as the tank will hold, coupons allowing."

## Carrying Liquor Is Cause For License To Be Withdrawn

The department of motor vehicles has authority to suspend the license of any operator or chauffeur, without preliminary hearing, upon showing by its records or other satisfactory evidence that the licensee has been convicted of illegal transportation of intoxicating liquors. Attorney General Harry McMullan ruled today in a digest of opinions.

However, the ruling stated, the department shall afford the licensee an opportunity for hearing to be held in the county in which the licensee resides, unless the department and the licensee agree that the hearing may be held in some other county.

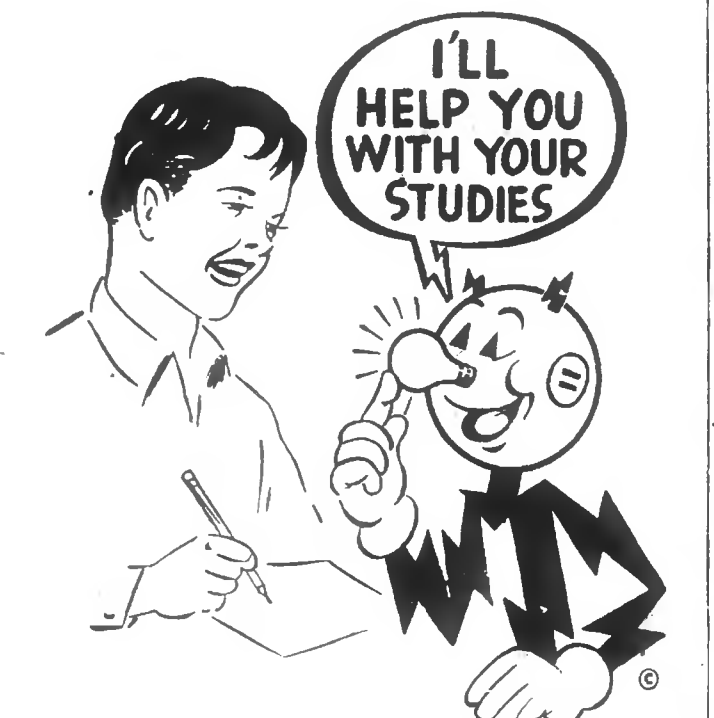
