

Local Girl Does Task For Victory At Bomber Plant

Baltimore, Md.—While the approaching collapse of Germany brings a natural happiness to all Americans, to Beulah Andrews, of North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, it does not mean the war will be over.

"I have a brother in Italy", she said here as she worked at her job building bombers in the Glenn L. Martin Company's plant, and until he gets back I'm going to keep doing my bit on the home front."

"I've been working in the Martin plant for many months, and have a sister, Eula, working here, too. I believe that in war-time, if you can't fight—work. It seems to me, from reading the newspapers and seeing the newsreels, that building bombers is one of the most important jobs to be done, so I came here to do my bit."

She plans to keep on with her present type of work after the war, too, a job she learned at the Martin Training School, which has turned out thousands of air-craftsmen to take the places of men called into service and to meet expanding production schedules.

"It looks like a bright future to me" she said. "If the 'Air Age' is coming, as many believe, I want to be in on it and help shape the future of the world's commercial air routes."

Radio Training Is Given By Navy

The Navy's program to select and train men in a \$11,000 course preparing them to be radio technicians has been widened to include those between the ages of 18 and 37 who have been found physically qualified for military service.

Lieut. W. W. Templin, Jr., Navy recruiting and induction officer for the state, announced today that new instructions make it possible to give the qualifying test to any man who has passed his pre-induction physical examination. Heretofore, only those men who volunteer for the Navy or who were assigned to the Navy at the induction centers were eligible to qualify for this training.

The qualifying test, it was announced, will be given, on a voluntary basis, to Navy volunteers and physically qualified pre-inductees at the Navy recruiting stations in the state. They are located at Asheville, Charlotte, Greensboro, New Bern, Raleigh, Salisbury, Wilmington, and Winston-Salem. Qualified preinductees will be assigned to the Navy at the time they are called for induction.

Lieut. Templin reviewed briefly the training course to be given. Men selected are enlisted as seamen first class, with a base pay of \$66.00 per month. They are sent to a university campus for a pre-radio course, where they receive instructions in mathematics, fundamental electricity and shop-work. Advanced training in higher mathematics, electricity, radio, the slide rule and shop practice follows. This marks the end of the first half of the training course, at which time they are

promoted to a third class petty officer rating, with a base pay of \$78.00 per month. After five more months of training in advanced radio and electronics, these men are promoted to the petty officer rating of radio technician second class, which carries a monthly base pay of \$98.00.

As preparation for taking the qualifying test, the recruiting officer suggested the use of any basic mathematics and physics textbooks, as well as books teaching the fundamentals of radio. Textbooks currently used to teach these subjects in high school are useful in preparing for the test, he pointed out.

Navy radio technicians are trained in the operation of radar devices, and the bulk of their instruction is in the field of electronics, Lieut. Templin said. He described electronics and radar as "important contributing factors in the successful prosecution of the war, and fields offering unlimited opportunities in the post-war world".
