

"American Red Cross operations at home and abroad will reach their wartime peak in 1945" Mr. O'Connor said today in announcing that the minimum goal for the Red Cross War Fund to be raised in March, 1945, had been fixed at \$180,000,000.

The central committee set the goal following careful review of budget estimates for the American Red Cross work in the United States and overseas for the year beginning March 1, 1945, Mr. O'Conner said. He added that Colby M. Chester, chairman of the executive committee of General Foods Corporation, will be chairman of the 1945 campaign.
