### W. P. Combs Now In Methodist Training

W. P. (Bill) Combs, son of Dr. and Mrs. Gilbert R. Combs, of this city, is attending a Methodist Youth Caravan Training Center at Lake Junaluska, N. C., for ten days in preparation for voluntary service during the next seven weeks in local Methodist churches in the Western North Carolina Conference, which comprises the western section of the state.

Selected because of his experience and leadership in Christian youth work, Bill is one of 88 college young people who are being trained at Lake Junaluska for work with 22 adult counselors in the 22 caravan teams.

Trained in special areas of young people's work, each caravan team will seek to "help revitalize and strengthen the youth programs of the seven Methodist churches they will successively serve, giving a clearer vision of the Christian's responsibility in every phase of life." Emphasis will be placed this year in work with returned servicemen and women in an effort to win them back into active participation in church programs. Special teams will serve in housing communities and rural areas.

Sponsored by staff members of the Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn., the Lake Junaluska training center is one of five being held in various parts of the country, training 352 caravaners in worship, evangelism, world friendship, youth programs, community service and recreation. Now in its eighth year, the caravan movement has reached more than 135,000 people in some 2,000 churches across the nation.

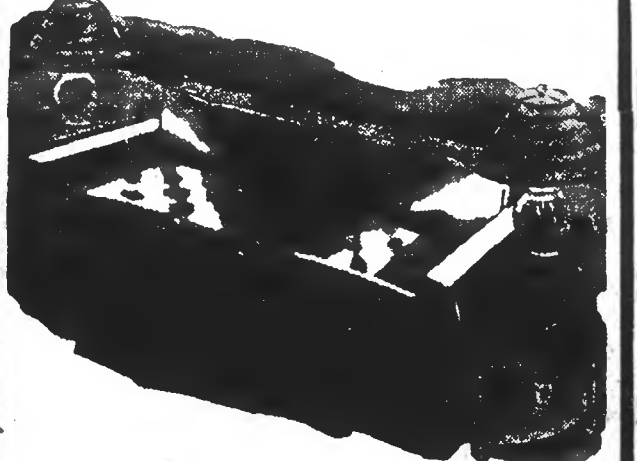
