It was announced today by Lawrence Miller, AAA Secretary, that the date of February 15 has been set up as the last day that reports can be made for farming operations for 1946 on which payment can be received. All farmers expecting payment for 1946 should visit the County Office and sign their applications for payment at the earliest possible date, definitely before February 15, 1947.

The County AAA Committee set up the last two weeks in January, beginning on January 20 and extending through January 31, as a time that they will be in the County Office for the purpose of interviewing farmers who want to sign up on the Program for 1947. All farmers who are interested in securing limestone, superphosphate, or seed on the program, should make a point to visit the County Office during this period and get their farms signed up.
