On Monday evening, under the sponsorship of the Woman's Society, Miss Kelly spoke at the North Wilkesboro First Methodist church, where she emphasized the need of more funds and more workers to carry on the work. There is a great need for leaders in every vocation. In her talk she gave a number of illustrations of native African boys and girls, from homes of poverty, and ignorance, who through their training in the missions schools, had become intelligent and useful citizens, and were assuming important positions of leadership.

On Tuesday morning, Miss Kelly a graduate of the North Wilkesboro high school, spoke in the school auditorium before a large group of grammar grade boys and girls, with their teachers, Misses Myrtle Tuttle, Myra Sale and Lucille Young, who are studying about Africa. The children enjoyed seeing one of the girls dressed in an African costume.


