

Bell Brothers Are Held For Robbery And Impersonation

Alleged To Have Posed As Officers, Collecting From Motorists

Glenn and Millard Bell, of Roaring River, are being held by State Highway Patrolmen here on charges of highway robbery with firearms, posing as officers, forgery and other counts.

Sgt. A. H. Clark and Sidney Carter, of the highway patrol, said that they had knowledge of at least four instances during the past several days where motorists in Wilkes and Yadkin counties at late hours of the night had been stopped and robbed or had been forced to pay \$25 or more in cash on threat of being taken to jail by the two men who said they were deputies.
