## Highway Engineer Will Go to Okinawa

Mount Airy, May 25.—Boice Macon, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Macon, of Mount Airy, has resigned his position with the State Highway commission and is waiting for traveling orders which will take him to Okinawa in the South Pacific, where he will assist the government in rebuilding the war damaged island.

Mr. Macon will serve as civil engineer for one year. All expenses are paid there and back if he stays the full year, but otherwise he must pay his own traveling expenses, according to the government regulations.

Mr. Macon's wife will reside with her mother, Mrs. James P. Ashby, in Winston-Salem, while he is in the South Pacific.

Mr. Macon has been an assistant engineer with the State for 18 months.

## Tobacco Plants Are Available In Georgia

Tobacco growers in North Carolina who are not able to get enough plants from local stock this year may fill out their crop with plants from Georgia and Florida, according to an announcement this week from Roy R. Bennett, tobacco specialist with the State College Extension Service.

"I am advised by the Georgia and Florida Extension Services," he said "that there are large supplies of tobacco plants available in those states for immediate transplanting."
