

Cricket Boy Lost While Swimming With Two Other Boys

Billie Miller, eight-year-old son of Mrs. Nora Miller Parsons, of Cricket, sank while swimming Saturday afternoon in the Yadkin river near Curtis bridge two miles west of here and today his body had not been re-

covered. The small boy, with Bryce Carlton, 13, and Donald Vannoy, 13, left their homes at Cricket to go swimming and members of their families thought they intended to go swimming in a small creek and did not know they were going to the river.
