

Wrightsville Plans For a Big Occasion

Wrightsville Beach, Aug. 5.—Two of the biggest indoor and outdoor attractions of the summer season will be witnessed here August 16-17 by an estimated 600 delegates and guests at the joint convention of the North Carolina Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Carolinas Press Photographers Association, convention chairmen announced today.

The indoor attraction will be the August 16 "Miss North Carolina" beauty contest from which some lucky Tar Heel girl will be selected to represent the state at the annual "Miss America" contest September 1-6 at Atlantic City, N. J. Bob Howard of Wilmington, chairman of the beauty pageant, said 25 of the state's 52 Jaycee groups have already entered girls in the competition from Albemarle, Asheville, Brevard, Charlotte, Durham, Elkin, Fayetteville, Gastonia, Goldsboro, Greenville, King's Mountain, Kinston, Mooresville, Morehead City, New Bern, North Wilkesboro, Reidsville, Robersonville, Rocky Mount, Statesville, Tarboro, Washington, Williamston, Wilmington and Wilson.

The contest will start at 3:30 p. m. Saturday, August 16, with a talent show in Lumina Pavilion. At 9 o'clock that night the girls will appear again for final judging of form and face, first in evening dress and then in bathing suits. The winner, to be crowned by State Jaycee President Edward Ellis of Charlotte, will receive a trophy and all-expenses-paid trip to the Atlantic City event. The two runners-up will also receive trophies.

Chick Production Gains 22 Per Cent

Raleigh.—Production of chicks by commercial hatcheries in North Carolina during June was about 22 per cent above production in June of 1946, it was announced this week by the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service in the State Department of Agriculture.

The number of chicks hatched during June totaled 2,670,000. While this figure is sharply above the output in the previous June, it is nearly 11 per cent below the 1941-45 June average of 3,009,000.

Total production in North Carolina during the first six months of this year was 28,283,000 chicks, slightly below the 28,459,000 hatched in the corresponding period of 1946.

Throughout the nation, production of chicks in the first half of 1947 totaled 1,051,311, nearly the same as the 1,054,977 hatched in the corresponding period last year.

EXPECT TO OPEN JONESVILLE TRACK ON AUGUST 10TH

The new Jonesville Speedway, located south of Jonesville high school, is expected to be completed by next week, and a championship stock car race is scheduled to feature the formal opening set for Sunday, August 10.

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R. P. Riley Ends 10 Years Selling Here

R. P. Riley, owner and manager of the Wilkesboro Live Stock Market, has just celebrated his 10th year of Live Stock handling at his market at North Wilkesboro, and records show he has only lost four days in the ten years of continuous selling. He lost three of these days during the flood of 1940 when extensive damage was done to his stock yards in the lowlands between the two towns of Wilkesboro and North Wilkesboro. The other day was lost in 1945 when still water backed up into his yards from high waters of the Yadkin river, on a sale day.

Mr. Riley has recently built a new stock barn and sales yard just east of Wilkesboro, near the state prison camp and will not be bothered with high water. At the new place he says he has plenty of room, plenty of parking space; on a good highway with two lanes for livestock and loading chutes covered.

Mr. Riley and his auctioneer, Harvey Ireland, who has been with him the full 10 years, have thousands of dollars worth of cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., for the farmers of Yadkin, Wilkes, Ashe, Alleghany and other counties of Northwest North Carolina.
