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

\$1.14 per hour, which amounts to approximately \$2,300 a year for a 40-hour work week. An additional 10 percent is paid for Adr. of E. C. sustomers of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, J. L. will be glad to know that he has Wright, Division Manager for mie Yarboro. returned home from the Davis North Carolina, stated the fuel oil situation is "tight, but if everything goes all right we can Miss Mary Hunter, who is a squeeze through." He said that student at Mitchell College in his company was making an all out effort, including doing many uneconomical things to attain a balance between supply and the

demands of customers. "This situation," he stated, "is not brought about by a shortage of petroleum in the ground, but is brought about by shortages of transportation, producing and refining facilities that could not be built during the war." He added that the usual post war

demands could not be foreseen. His letter went on to say that the industry in general is building additional facilities but this will take some time before relief will be in sight.

"Standard Oil Company of New Jersey," he stated, "stopped some time ago, when it appeared the situation would be tight; converting people or concerns who are burning coal or gas, to oil. Advertising was stopped promoting the sales of Esso oil burners and heating oil and, we have not increased our number of customers excepting owners of homes just built, principally veterans' homes."

He offered these suggestions for the heating oil season. "Fill your tanks now, economize in securing greater efficiency from your burners in every possible way, save heat, thereby stretching the amount of fuel oil avail-

He mentioned that since announcing the company's "holdthe-line" price policy on July 24, the company has not raised prices to householders, or to dealers, distributors, commercial and industrial consumers on gasoline, kerosene and heating oil although most other suppliers recently have done so. He said, 'We don't know how long we can continue such a price policy but we intend to follow it as long as we can."
