cream can make enough dressing for salad to serve six, thus saving salad oil. A recipe that is especially good for a chilled fruit salad is: Use 2 whole eggs or 4 egg volks: 1-4 cup vinegar; 1 cup sour cream; 1-2 T. sugar; 1,2 t. salt; 1-4 t. mustard; 1-8

t. paprika. Beat the eggs and add the other ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Cook in a double boiler and stir constantly until the mixture thickens. Chill before serving on chilled fruit.
