City Council In Busy Session For Month Of October

North Wilkesboro city council in October meeting transacted a number of business items of public interest.

Present for the meeting were Mayor R. T. McNeil, Clerk W. P. Kelly and all commissioners, G. R. Andrews, Max Foster, C. J. Swofford, C. E. Jenkins and I. H. McNeill, Jr.

Salary of A. C. Williams, watershed inspector, was raised from \$15 to \$40 per month in order that he may devote more time to inspection duties.

Mrs. J. H. Winkler was employed as truant officer and welfare worker, at a salary of \$60 per month. Her appointment was made retroactive to September 7, the date she began work.

Clerk W. P. Kelly was ordered to advertise for bids to sell the rock crusher owned by the town. C. J. Swofford and G. R. Andrews were appointed as a committee to purchase a power mower for the town.

The city council called attention to the state law requiring that old wells be filled up and closed, and asked that the section of law relating to the subject be published as follows:

"GS. 14-287. Leaving unused well open and exposed.—It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, after discontinuing the use of any well, to leave said well open and exposed; said well, after the use of same has been discontinued, shall be carefully and securely filled: Provided, that this shall not apply to wells on farms that are protected by curbing or board walls. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined or imprisoned, in the discretion of the court. (1923, c. 125; C. S. 4426(c).)"

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Key Club Here Is Favoring Proposal Consolidate Schools

The North Wilkesboro Key Club, a service organization recently organized among the high school students, went on record this week as unanimously endorsing the proposal to consolidate North Wilkesboro and Wilkesboro high schools into one central high school.

high school would have many advantages.

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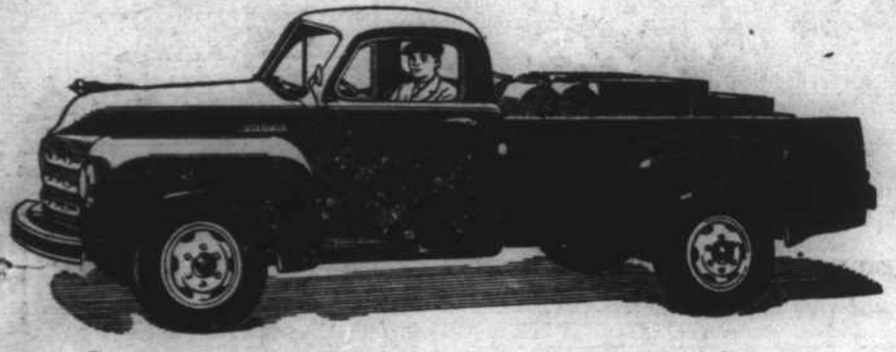
